Via a new theory of investigative agenda-setting in the federal legislature, I argue that investigations in Congress constitute public narratives aimed at facilitating two collective goods: change of status-quo policy and accountability for institutional actors who have violated legitimate legal and policy frameworks. My project makes two primary contributions. First, I show that oversight is a fundamental part of the policymaking process; both chambers, over time, have prioritized hearings devoted to issues, or <i>policy problems</i>, over hearings on waste, fraud and abuse in the executive branch.
